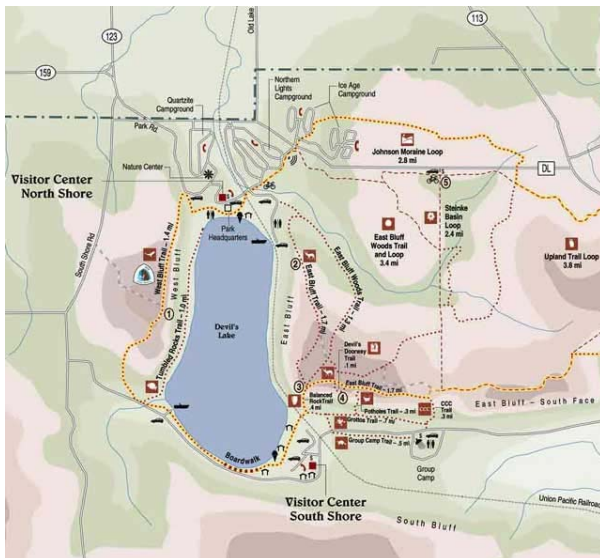
Devil's Lake State Park – South Shore, Red Oak Shelter

*(Daily or seasonal park permits are required)

How to Get There

From the south or east on Interstate Highway 90/94, take State Highway 33 west about 15 miles to Baraboo. Turn left (south) on State Highway 123 (Broadway) and follow 123 about 3 miles, then bear right onto South Shore Rd., go 1.5 miles, then left onto South Lake Road, and 1 mile to the South Shore Visitor Center.

From the northwest on I-90/94, go right (south) at exit 92. Take US Highway 12-East (south) about 10 miles to State Highway 159. Turn left (east) on Highway 159 and go about 2 miles to Hwy 123. Go right 1/8 mile, then bear right onto South Shore Rd., go 1.5 miles, then left onto South Lake Road, and 1 mile to the South Shore Visitor Center.



From the south on US 12, turn right (east) on Highway 159 and follow directions above.

The **Red Oak Shelter** is the largest shelter on the South Shore – it is on the lake edge near the northernmost parking area.
